Are you completing a dissertation? Have you recently completed one? Are you preparing for a conference? Submitting for a publication? Do you have research that has been left on the back-burner for too long and wish to breathe new life into it? Blackwell Talks are designed to showcase and support budding scholarship at its early stages.

Submission Details

Proposals must include:

- 1. Exact title of your presentation
- 2. Presenter name with a short biography
- 3. Presenter department
- 4. Presenter email address & phone
- 5. Semester and Year of most recent Blackwell Talk, if applicable

- 6. *Project Description*: Include a description of the subject of your presentation written for a general audience (250 word maximum).
- 7. Description of Project Status: Include a description of the current state of the project and how this project represents a work in progress that will benefit through feedback from talk attendees. You could include questions or concerns that you have about moving forward with your research project (250 words maximum).

Selected presentations will all take place through Zoom and the presentation should last no more than 30 minutes. The discussion portion of the talk will be facilitated by a moderator presenting questions and comments to the speaker from the chat feature in Zoom. Presenters may use slides for the talk but it is by no means mandatory. The audience for the Blackwell Talks will consist of your fellow scholars and colleagues from various academic areas, and the atmosphere is kept purposefully relaxed.

We encourage presenters to attend all sessions in support of their fellow Scholars.

All talks will be on Mondays from 12:00 to 12:50.
