Policy\*

A senior at Longwood University may take up to six (6) hours of graduate credit beyond the undergraduate degree requirements that may be counted towards the undergraduate graduate degree and graduate degrees electives in the undergraduate degree. Such graduate credit may be earned only in 500-level courses and, if it meets course requirements for the degree, may be counted toward a master's Master's master's degree. The senior must have an overall GPA that meets the minimum GPA required for admission to the graduate program which offers the course and must receive permission from the department chair of their major and then the Dean of the College of Graduate and Professional Studies. In any case where an undergraduate student is registered for a 500-level course that is to be applied to a graduate degree, the Dean of the College of Graduate and Professional Studies must notify the Office of the Registrar of this designation.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Long time policy allows seniors to take a maximum of 6 credit hours of 500-level graduate course work for graduate credit. These credits do not apply to the bachelor's degree. Financial aid policy will not allow these credits to count toward financial aid eligibility because they do not apply to the bachelor's degree. SACSCOC now allows for exceptional students, limited credits to double-count.

SACSCOC states: Another common situation is to allow students to begin graduate work before completing the undergraduate degree, then "double-counting" some of the graduate work to award both a baccalaureate and a master's degree upon completion of the work. For exceptional students, a limited amount of this activity could easily be academically justified.

### **RATIONALE**

Undergraduate students will now be able to take courses that move them to graduate study without being penalized in their undergraduate financial aid as the graduate credit hours will count towards full-time status.
