 Program Catalog Description\*
 The U.S. Race and Ethnic Studies minor offers an interdisciplinary exploration of the concepts of race and ethnicity across the curriculum. The program investigates race and ethnic identities as social, cultural, historical, and material realities and explores the construction and maintenance of those identities in U.S. culture. The interdisciplinary nature of the minor allows students to analyze race and ethnic identities, as well as the social issues connected to those populations, across academic fields of study and develops a social justice framework for engaging with contemporary issues of race and ethnicity.

## Follow these steps to propose (changes to) the program curriculum:

## Step 1 Add all courses to be used in program.

Start in <sup>III</sup> "View Curriculum Courses." There are two options to add courses for proposed changes: "Add Course" and "Import Course." For courses already in the catalog, click on "Import Course" and find the courses needed. For new classes going through a Curriculog Approval Process click on "Add Course"-- a box will open asking you for the Prefix, Course Number and Course Title.

#### Step 2 Set up program requirements.

Click on "Add Courses" to bring up the list of courses available from Step 1. Select the courses you wish to add. If you mistakenly added a course and need to remove it, click on the X and proceed.

Examples of such courses include ENGL 337, ENGL 362, ENGL 384, and ENGL 441. Students may count Civitae courses for both the minor and their Civitae pillar or perspectives requirements. ## **RATIONALE FOR PROGRAM**

A minor in U.S. Race and Ethnic Studies is an important addition to the curriculum because it will provide students with opportunities to understand the complexities of human experience as well as the historical and social issues of race and ethnicity in American culture. Race and ethnic identities are an organizing principle of American society, influencing economic, political, and social access. Studying how unequal access and privilege have been defined by race will make students more informed of the potentials and the obstacles for creating change in our culture. The social justice emphasis of the minor will enhance Longwood's mission to develop citizen leaders, inform students' understanding of their communities and histories, and engage students' desires to create a more equitable society.
