

After ten years of service in an eligible position, a participating member may make a one time, irrevocable election to transfer from a defined contribution plan to the defined benefit plan. Upon making such election, any accrued contributions and earnings in the member's defined contribution account shall be used to purchase service credit in the defined benefits plan as provided in subsection F.
20 21 22	I J. The Virginia Retirement System shall (i) develop policies and procedures for the administration of the plan and (ii) provide a program of education and support for participating members.

11	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:
12	1. That § <u>23-7.4:1</u> of the Code of Virginia is amended as follows:
13 14	D. Partial Tuition Waiver for Dependent Children of University and College Faculty.
15 16 17 18	(a) Each year the General Assembly shall allocate funds in the Appropriation Act to provide 50% tuition waivers to the dependent children of faculty members who have been employed full time by any one or more public Virginia colleges or universities for an aggregate period of at least 7 years, and who are currently employed as a full time faculty member in a public Virginia college or university.
19 20 21 22	(b) Tuition waivers shall be used for undergraduate education at any higher education institution under the governance or supervision of the State Council of Higher Education.
22 23 24 25 26 27 28 29	(b) To be eligible to receive a partial tuition waiver, dependent children of eligible faculty of a Virginia college or university (i) must be under the age of 21 at the commencement of the academic year during which the partial tuition waiver is to be effective, (ii) must have been admitted to a Virginia university or college under the same admissions requirements, standards and policies which the admitting university or college applies to all applicants, or (iii) a current student in good standing at a public Virginia university or college.
30 31 32 33 34	(c) An eligible applicant who has continued to maintain satisfactory academic progress toward graduation may have his or her partial tuition waiver renewed until the time he or she has accumulated tuition waivers for a maximum of 120 undergraduate academic credit hours, or has reached the age of 25, whichever occurs first.
35 36 37 38	(d) No partial tuition waiver offered or allocated to any eligible applicant in accordance with the provisions of this Section shall be charged against any other tuition waiver limitation established by the Commonwealth of Virginia.
39 40 41	(e) This partial tuition waiver shall not apply to students enrolled under the academic common market agreement.
42 43	(f) The State Council of Higher Education shall prescribe procedures, rules and regulations as are necessary to implement and administer the provisions of this Section.

Tuition and required fees may be waived for a student from a foreign country enrolled in a public institution of higher education through a student exchange program approved by such institution, provided the number of foreign students does not exceed the number of students paying full tuition and required fees to the institution under the provisions of the exchange program for a given three-year period.
