TOPIC: Redefining Hybrid/Blended Classes

BACKGROUND (Provide a brief statement describing the origins of this proposal, the nature of the problem it addresses, and the work completed to devise the proposal):

This committee began discussing syllabi for online and hybrid/blended classes two years ago; this lead to a discussion of the need for course registration descriptions and syllabi to realistically reflect how classes are conducted—both for students and for accrediting agencies. Because the university would have lost revenue by enlarging the number of courses considered hybrid/blended, no change was proposed. Since the BOV changed the way fees are structured in 2014, categorization of courses has no effect on fees charged; therefore, we propose redefining the way the terms *hybrid* and *blended* are used in the *FPPM* to more accurately describe the actual contact hours of instruction in courses. Students—both those who embrace online coursework and those who avoid it—have expressed concern about not having a clear sense of the quantity and timing of face-to-face and online meetings when they are selecting and registering for classes. This change would address that issue and also prevent compliance problems with accrediting agencies. There can be serious consequences for the university when syllabi indicate routine online interaction not reflected in the registration status of courses.

SCHEV and other agencies insist that any course with at least 50% of interaction online be defined as hybrid/blended, but it is fine to have that percentage go lower. The trend now is to go lower. Currently, the English and Modern Languages Department, for example, has a number of classes that have one out of three class meetings online, yet these are listed as fully face-to-face courses. Our definition would address that problem. We have discussed this proposed change with representatives from departments all over the university and with SCHEV and have their approval. The Registrar is also in agreement about the need for this. Once the change is made, department chairs would need to attend to the coding of classes.

Current definitions do not allow for the registration status of many courses to be accurately described. This causes two problems: students cannot tell how much of a course is offered online; there can be serious consequences for the university when syllabi indicate routine online interaction not reflected in the registration status of courses.
